

We need an enthusiast with excellent groupwork skills to assist Wester Hailes residents to explore their history and heritage, and where and how they can find out more about it. This is intended to improve understanding of the attraction of Edinburgh as a tourist centre.

This is a 13 week, part time pilot course (beginning in January) intended to provide access to employment opportunities in the fast growing tourism industry, possibly after a period of futher study. The course content will be negotiated with participants but is likely to include Basic Skills (Literacy, Numeracy, Keyboard / Computing); Tourism in General; Edinburgh's Visitor Attractions; The History, Heritage and Culture of Scotland and it's Capital; and Customer Care. WHOT will provide a Guidance and Couselling input and organise work experience placements.

Whilst this is intended to underpin work in tourism related jobs in hotel, catering and retail in addition to visitor attractions and galleries, we believe that the learning process is of great value in itself and this course subscribes to the philosophy of Edinburgh as a City of Lifelong Learning.

A feature of the course will be the emphasis on getting out and about, and building an understanding that Edinburgh belongs as much to residents of Wester Hailes as of the New Town. The bulk of tutoring, specifically on history and culture, and the arranging of visits will be the Course Co-ordinator's responsibility; there is provision for external tutors to be used for 'basic skills' and tourist industry specific material.








group plus the chance to enjoy the developing theatrical talents of all Wester Hailes' actors and actresses.

Moving Parts

Individual members of Moving Parts, both old and new, can be seen in key roles throughout the show. The group are Wester Hailes' most established and experienced theatre troupe. Their work consists of creating an annual tour as well as one off productions in response to requests from the community.

Bash


